



Staff Spotlight Dan Theberge



A Christmas Memory is a short story by Truman Capote. Originally published in Mademoiselle magazine in December 1956, it was reprinted in The Selected Writings of Truman Capote in 1963. It was issued in a stand-alone hardcover edition by Random House in 1966, and it has been published in many editions and anthologies since. The largely autobiographical story, which takes place in the 1930s,

describes a period in the lives of the seven-year-old narrator and an elderly woman who is his distant cousin and best friend. The evocative narrative focuses on country life, friendship, and the joy of giving during the Christmas season, and it also gently yet poignantly touches on loneliness and loss.

This holiday classic is presented in honor of John Peterson as it was his desire to present this reading to his Taylor Community Friends.



Anyone who knows Tammy Levesque, knows she's not one to be at a loss for words... but she wrote down her speech for her OASC Hikers' Club presentation, so very proud of "her people" that she didn't want to miss anything.

When Resident Bob Ilgenfritz (84) approached Tammy early this year about hiking the Belknap Range with residents, she thought he was crazy. But once she thought about it some more, she thought there might be a couple of residents who might like to do "a" hike this season. Once approved by her supervisor she decided to give it a shot, and instead of worrying about all the "what ifs," began to focus on the possibilities...

She began a Hike Conditioning Class in February with 15 participants, and was surprised by so much interest. They started doing 10 "sit-to-stands" and three flights of stairs, and ended the program in April doing 100 "sit-to-stands" and five cycles of three flights of stairs. Impressive; they were ready!

The group, ages 68 to 85, first took a gentle walk at Ahern State Park, and then a second to Rattlesnake with everyone enjoying the trek and the view. Both were good measures on how they would do on the upcoming adventures.

Participants kicked off the 12 hikes required to earn their Belknap Range patches with Belknap and Piper in June; Whiteface, Mack and Klem in July; Rowe, Quarry and Gunstock in August; Rand and Anna in September; finishing with Straightback and Major in October. They had some challenging hikes, and weather conditions that altered their dates, but the crew was focused and undeterred. They had their sights set on the patch!

Earning Belknap Range patches were Diane Beaman, John Earley, Carol Ford, John Ford, Bob Ilgenfritz, John Larson, Fred Neinas and Tammy. Mel Greenberg, Charlotte Leavitt, Vince Lunetta, Charlotte McKinnon and Bryan Walker have almost completed the 12 peaks, and received recognition.

Tammy, outwardly emotional at the event, congratulated the group. "This journey brought us together; it made us stronger; it made us believe that age is only a number and that numbers can not define these individuals." She concluded her speech with a tribute to Taylor resident Dave Beaman, recently passed. "The most human experience of all is the experience of love and loss. If there's anything we can be sure of, it's that no matter how differently we live our lives, we will one day experience the loss of a loved one. It's important to appreciate our differences, and also to remind ourselves how much we have in common in desiring a life worth living. It has been my honor to know Dave Beaman and the joy he brought to the experience of living. Diane, we are with you, and connected by the hiking shoe forever!"



Wednesday – November 14 – Lecture Program: *Wills and Estates, Dorcas Gordon* – Come get the facts on Estate Law in an informative presentation by Dorcas Gordon. She will focus on estate planning documents that all individuals should have in place, including Revocable Trusts, Last Wills and Testaments, Durable Powers of Attorney for financial matters and Durable Powers of Attorney for Healthcare and Living Will Declarations. Gordon will discuss how correct use of these documents can avoid probate and guardianship proceedings, and highlight recent changes in the law which may make it necessary for individuals to update their current documents. Wednesday – November 14 – Presentation: *Henri Chapelle American Cemetery, Aimee Fogg* – Seven years ago Aimee Fogg traveled to Belgium to learn about her great-uncle's death in World War II. Today she has a new appreciation for life — and a growing collection of adopted relatives. The men and women she now considers family share one thing in common: a loved one buried at Henri Chapelle Cemetery in Hamburg, Belgium. By the end of the war, it was the largest temporary American cemetery in Europe. Many of the 17,000 soldiers have been returned to the United States for burial, but nearly 8,000 remain. Fogg, who lives in Gilford, has collected stories and photos about the 40 New Hampshire men and the 24 from Vermont buried at Henri-Chapelle and published them in a pair of books. She's now documenting the accounts of 54 soldiers from Maine. Join us as she shares her story. **This presentation will take place at Woodside beginning at 6:30PM.**



Thursday – November 15 – Foreign Film Series: *The Seventh Seal, by Ingmar Bergman* – A 1957 Swedish historical fantasy film written and directed by Ingmar Bergman set in Denmark during the Black Death, it tells of the journey of a medieval knight and a game of chess he plays with the personification of Death, who has come to take his life. Bergman developed the film from his own play *Wood Painting*. The title refers to a passage from the Book of Revelation, used both at the very start of the film, and again towards the end, beginning with the words "And when the Lamb had opened the seventh seal, there was silence in heaven about the space of half an hour." Here the motif of silence refers to the "silence of God," which is a major theme of the film. *The Seventh Seal* is considered a classic of world cinema and as one of the greatest movies of all time. **This event will be held in the Woodside Theater beginning at 2:00PM.**



Monday – November 19 – Warren Bailey: Greater Lakes Region Children's Auction – In 1982, WLNH radio host Warren Bailey, responding to the needs of Lakes Region Children and their families, created a two day fundraising broadcast from the WLNH van in front of the Laconia YMCA. They raised \$2,100 and collected a number of items to be donated to the "Citizen Santa Fund." WLNH worked tirelessly to grow this event into a multi-day radio auction over the next fifteen years. Through the generosity of several different landlords the Auction found a home each year in store fronts throughout Downtown Laconia. Under WLNH's direction, multitudes of people became involved in this event and the "Greater Lakes Region Children's Auction" took on a life of its own. Join us as Mr. Bailey shares the story and the successes of the Greater Lakes Region Children's Auction. **This lecture will be take place at Woodside at 6:30PM.**

Tuesday – November 20 – Documentary: We the People; The Market Basket Effect – Corporate greed breaks up a four-billion-dollar supermarket empire in this dramatic documentary which charts the volatile conflict between warring cousins and arch-rivals Arthur T. Demoulas and Arthur S. Demoulas for control of their Market Basket chain of stores. With plot twists worthy of a Greek tragedy, the family feud raged on with the livelihoods of 25,000 employees hanging in the balance. The centerpiece of *A Victorian Christmas* is an original toy theatre adaptation of Charles Dickens' *A Christmas Carol*. 

