

The Meadowlark Trio — Artists' Bios

April Sun, Piano



Boston-based pianist April Sun thrives as an imaginative, sincere, and versatile performer and teacher. She is a founding member of the Meadowlark Trio—semifinalists in the Fischhoff Chamber Music Competition (2017), artist-fellows for Music for Food (2019)—and she frequently plays with the Phoenix Chamber Orchestra and the Cape Cod Chamber Orchestra. April has also collaborated with members of the Chiara Quartet, Escher Quartet, Cleveland Orchestra, Toronto Symphony, and St. Paul Chamber Orchestra.

April is deeply invested in music education, service, and activism. She has shared music in schools, nursing homes, and community centers throughout the nation, and she currently teaches piano and chamber music at the Brookline Music School and the Rivers Conservatory. Additionally, April serves as the communications manager at Music for Food—an organization that uses music to generate funds for food pantries. From 2016–2018, she was an Artist-in-Residence at Judson Park, as part of an intergenerational living initiative.

April holds a DMA in collaborative piano at the Cleveland Institute of Music (CIM), where she also received both a M.M. in piano performance, a certificate in pedagogy, and the Bennett Levine Chamber Music Award. She completed her B.A. in music, with minors in English and Art History, at the University of Nebraska—Lincoln. Her incredible mentors have included Daniel Shapiro, Anita Pontremoli, Paul Barnes, Kim Kashkashian, Peter Salaff, Bayla Keyes, Sharon Robinson, Francesca Brittan, and Susan McClary. Away from the piano, April enjoys films, bikes, poems, hikes, strong beverages, and small bites.



Janny Joo, Violin

Violinist Janny Joo is a multifaceted musician who is equally at home in chamber, orchestra, and solo recital settings. She is a founding member of the Meadowlark Piano Trio, a recent semi-finalist of the Fischhoff International Chamber Music Competition, and enjoys performing works from the established repertoire as well as championing works from contemporary composers with the trio.

An active chamber musician, Janny has studied chamber music with the members of the Chiara, Muir, and St. Lawrence String Quartets, the Triple Helix Piano Trio, and violist Kim Kashkashian. She has also performed with such artists as Bayla Keyes, Cho-Liang Lin, Kim Kashkashian, Hsin-Yun Huang, Desmond Hoebig, Rhonda Rider, William Fitzpatrick, and Norman Fischer.

She has served as the concertmaster of numerous orchestras, which includes Symphony Nova in recent years, and she currently holds the Principal 2nd Violin chair of Phoenix Orchestra and the Assistant Principal 2nd Violin chair of the Cape Symphony. She also performs with Chorus Pro Musica, BMOP, Cantata Singers, and guests with A Far Cry, Boston Lyric Opera, and Boston Ballet.

Janny is passionate about teaching and coaching the next generation of musicians, and has taught violin as well as theory classes at Boston University where she received her Doctorate degree in Violin Performance. She received her M.M. degree from Shepherd School of Music at Rice University and her B.A. degree with minors in Math and History from University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

Believing that an artist is also a citizen who has a duty to further social justice, she is serving as the Finance Manager for the Music for Food organization this year, which is a musician-led initiative for local hunger relief. She will be working with the artists in the organization to benefit food pantries all around the United States, as well as in Canada and Taiwan.

Her primary teachers include Bayla Keyes, Cho-Liang Lin, Hyeyung Yoon of the Chiara String Quartet, and Hal Grossman.

In her free time, she enjoys ballroom dancing, horseback riding, traveling, and photography.



Hyun-Ji Kwon, Cello

Hyun-Ji Kwon, cellist, currently maintains an active schedule as soloist, chamber musician, and teacher. She earned her Bachelor of Music degree at Ewha Women's University in Seoul, Korea, and was the winner of the top prize at the Seoul Symphony Orchestra Competition and the third prize at the Seoul Youth Chamber Music Competition. She was the principal cellist for the Ewha orchestra and performed as a soloist with the orchestra for two consecutive years.

She came to Boston to study at the New England Conservatory, where she earned a Master of Music in cello performance as well as a Graduate Diploma. From there she moved on to complete a Doctor of Musical Arts in cello performance at Boston University's School of Music, in the studio of Rhonda Rider. Her other teachers have included Natasha Brofsky, Il-hwan Bai and Sungwon Yang.

Kwon has performed in master classes for renowned cellists such as Natalia Gutman and Anner Bylsma, and she has participated in numerous music festivals and concerts in both Korea and North America. During her studies at BU, she was selected numerous times to perform in joint Faculty/DMA candidate "Chamber Music Masterworks" concerts, and she was awarded special String Department Honors upon graduation as well as membership in the national honorary society Pi Kappa Lambda. She has performed as guest alumna along with the celebrated Muir Quartet and violist Michelle LaCourse at BU's Tsai Center, with the Convergence Ensemble, and in several other Boston area ensembles.

Kwon taught at Boston University as a cello faculty from 2015 to 2020. Currently she serves as a cello faculty at Phillips Exeter Academy, Co-Director of Boston University Tanglewood Institute (BUTI) Cello Workshop, cello coach at BUTI's Young Artist Orchestra Program, and chamber instructor at Project STEP.

Looking for a TED Talk?

TED TALKS Try *The Beauty and Complexity of Finding Common Ground*, by Matt Trombley. How can we disagree with one another, respectfully and productively?

In this thoughtful talk, team builder Matt Trombley reflects on "agonism" —the tendency to take a rigid stance on issues— and shares why finding aspects of agreement can be the first step in resolving conflict. "When you can find even the smallest bit of common ground with somebody, it allows you to understand the beautiful wonder and complexity and majesty of the other person," he says.

From Russ Jones: Agility Exercise

This is a total body exercise that builds coordination, balance and strength required for improved agility.

- 1) Posture yourself slightly bent at the waist, holding an appropriate weight with both hands in between your legs.
- 2) Safely transition the weight to your right hand.
- 3) Simultaneously lift the right arm directly in front of your body, arm straight, while stepping forward a comfortable distance with your left leg.
- 4) Simultaneously move your right arm and left leg back to the posture described in step 1.
- 5) Safely transition the weight to your left hand.
- 6) Simultaneously lift the left arm directly in front of your body, arm straight, while stepping forward a comfortable distance with your right leg.
- 7) Simultaneously move your left arm and right leg back to the posture described in step 1.
- 8) Repeat until your form deteriorates.

Erin Harpe has been hailed as "an authentic blues chanteuse," as well as a celebrated guitarist and purveyor of early fingerstyle blues. (She is often compared to Memphis Minnie, JoAnn Kelley, Rory Block, or Bonnie Raitt.) Erin grew up learning fingerstyle guitar from her dad, Neil Harpe, and piedmont blues luminaries such as John Cephas & Phil Wiggins, John Jackson, Eleanor Ellis, and Warner Williams, at Washington DC's famed Archie's Barbershop. Erin has been recognized as "the next star in the acoustic blues" by TheCountryBlues.com, which recently wrote that "Erin Harpe has it all... the skills as an exceptional guitar fingerpicker, the musical heritage and knowledge, a wonderful voice, great stage presence and star-quality good looks to boot." Erin has toured all over the US and Europe, opened for ZZ Top, Buddy Guy, James Cotton, Honeyboy Edwards and more, headlined festivals, and released three critically-acclaimed albums. 





Wednesday, November 25 —
Open World: Video Games and Contemporary Art



This dynamic exhibition explores how contemporary artists have been influenced by the culture of video games pervasive in popular culture since the 1970s. It features painting, sculpture, textiles, prints, drawings, animation, video games, video game modifications, and game-based performances and interventions.

The artworks in *Open World* reference a broad cross-section of games, ranging from early text adventure and arcade games to modern multi-player online roleplaying games and first-person shooters. Participating artists are influenced by some of the most popular video game franchises including Super Mario Bros., The Legend of Zelda, The Sims, and Final Fantasy.

Drawings of the Underground Railroad

In a series of drawings, artist Richard Haynes tells the story of an enslaved family's dangerous journey along the Underground Railroad, from a southern plantation to freedom in Canada. The narrative of hope, struggle, and triumph is based on historic accounts, and traditional quilting patterns evoke the themes in dynamic compositions. Faceless figures represent the thousands of slaves who made the journey as well as the hidden lives of countless others who died in servitude. The brilliant colors suggest that joy can be found even in horrific situations.



Haynes is an artist, author, and educator based in Portsmouth, NH; he has been an artist-in-residence at the Currier Art Center, and his work is featured in the Museum's collection.

Photographs from the Civil Rights Movement



Protests have been fundamental to American democracy since the country's founding, and artists have often given powerful expression to calls for change. Drawn from the museum's collection, these photographs were made in the course of the Civil Rights protests in the 1950s and 1960s.

The passion, tragedy, and essential humanity of the Movement emerge in these images. Some were made by outside observers, while others were taken by participants in the protests. Photographers brought wider attention and understanding to key events such as the Selma to Montgomery March of 1965. Photographer Ernest Withers (1922-2007) created some of the most compelling images of the American Civil Rights Movement; in particular, his photographs of the Memphis Sanitation Workers' Strike of 1968 brought nationwide attention to the plight of African Americans trying to succeed in a systemically racist political and cultural system.

On July 1, 1997, the New Hampshire State Veterans Cemetery was legislatively established. The facility was funded jointly by the State and Federal Governments. Wednesday, November 18 — America's Stonehenge

Built by a Native American Culture or a migrant European population? No one knows for sure. A maze of man-made chambers, walls and ceremonial meeting places, at over 4,000 years old America's Stonehenge is most likely the oldest man-made construction in the United States. Like Stonehenge in England, America's Stonehenge was built by ancient people well versed in astronomy and stone construction. It has been determined that the site is an accurate astronomical calendar. It was, and still can be, used to determine specific solar and lunar events of the year. Various inscriptions have been found throughout the site including Ogham, Phoenician and Iberian Punic Script. Dr. Barry Fell of Harvard University did extensive work on the inscriptions found at the site. They are detailed in his book *America B.C.* Admission is \$11.00 per person. 
"The Village People of Chester"
