The past few years have been an exciting time for Taylor Community. We have seen a great deal of growth, with the enhancement of existing facilities and the opening of new buildings. Just five years ago, Taylor had 406 residents and 190 employees. As of this writing, in 2024, Taylor Community has 584 residents and 341 employees.

What is so remarkable about Taylor is the fact that even as we have grown into one of the largest charitable organizations in the State, we have never lost sight of why we are here—to serve seniors in the Lakes Region—and we have remained steadfast in meeting our mission. From Resident Life to Dining, Wellness to Facilities, Social Services to Clinical—across all departments, our team excels every day in providing a community in which our residents will thrive.

It is with this focus on our mission in mind that we recently made the decision to acquire Meredith Bay Colony Club. This expansion not only provides another option for seniors looking to take advantage of all that Taylor has to offer, but it also exemplifies our mission by ensuring that the 80+ residents who are living at Meredith Bay will be protected. It is not often that a non-profit is able to step up to the plate to financially rescue another non-profit in our community, but we are pleased to be able to do so. In addition, this expansion will enable us to move forward with constructing a new, state-of-the-art healthcare building on our Laconia campus, and enhance our assisted living, memory care, and nursing services. It's an arrangement that works incredibly well for Taylor and Meredith Bay Colony Club's residents and staff, and the greater community.

Taylor Community has been caring for seniors in the Lakes Region for 117 years. What started as a small care home has expanded to become the premiere retirement community in New Hampshire, with campuses throughout the Lakes Region. But as much as we have grown over the years, our commitment to our residents and staff has never been stronger. It is the people who live and work here that make Taylor a truly exceptional community.

COMMITMENT TO CARE

One of the many benefits for residents living at Taylor is the availability of our Social Service - Care Management team. This dedicated group of social workers, registered nurses, and licensed nursing assistants, led by Director Hank Offinger, MSW, have long been an invaluable resource to those who live at Taylor, supporting residents' safety and comfort in their homes in all levels of care, and helping them to navigate the continuum of care at Taylor as well as the healthcare system.

Offinger and his team are not only supporting our residents, but also providing some much-needed supportive services in the wider Laconia and Wolfeboro communities. Several years ago, Offinger launched a Caregiver Support Group for residents on our Laconia campus, to fill a void in the services available to support people doing the exceedingly difficult job of caring for a loved one in their home. However, there was recognition that this was a void not only for our own residents, but for the community-at-large.

To help meet this need, in the past year, we have launched a Cancer Support Group on our Laconia campus, and a Caregiver Support Group focused on issues around memory loss on our Wolfeboro campus. We are also in the process of launching a Group for families and loved ones of those living with cancer — all of these Support Groups are open to our community.

Our mission to care for seniors in the Lakes Region does not end with our own resident population – we strive to be good neighbors in our community.


