Elm Room, Woodside • 7:15 a.m.

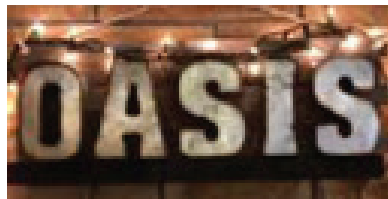
Time for our monthly Men's Breakfast – on Wednesday, November 6th in the Woodside Elm Room since it is the 1st Wed of the month. As usual, coffee will be ready about 7:15 a.m., with food at about 7:30 a.m., and the speaker from 8:00 a.m to 9:00 a.m.

This month our speaker will be Krista Larsen. You may remember her from two years ago when she spoke to us as Laconia's Assistant Public Works Director. She has since changed jobs and is now working for the state Department of Environmental Services as a Construction Management Engineer in the Wastewater Engineering Bureau, Water Division, and is responsible for monitoring compliance with Federal and State funding rules for wastewater and stormwater infrastructure projects.

Krista will discuss wastewater treatment basics, the Winnepesaukee River Basin Program, and some interesting things to know about Federal funding, as well as the many disciplines that are encountered at a wastewater treatment facility – from biology and chemistry to HVAC and computer programming. She will also discuss how sewer system operators and State regulators work together to protect public health and ensure a clean environment for New Hampshire.

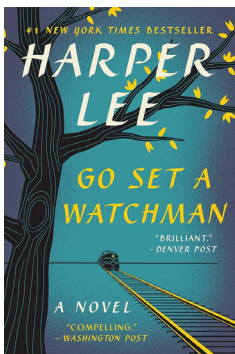

Harvard Museum - Cambridge, MA

The Harvard Museum of Natural History (HMNH) was established in 1998 as the public face of three research museums:

HARVARD UNIVERSITY HERBARIA - Botanical gardens with over five million specimens. This collection is one of the ten largest herbaria in the world and the world's largest University-owned herbarium.

MINERALOGICAL & GEOLOGICAL MUSEUM - The oldest University mineral collection in the nation began in 1784. This collection contains more than 100,000 specimens and ranks among the world's finest.

MUSEUM OF COMPARATIVE ZOOLOGY - Founded in 1859, this museum contains over 21 specimens.

GLASS FLOWERS - One of Harvard's most famous treasures is the internationally acclaimed "Ware Collection of Blaschka Glass Models of Plants - the "Glass Flowers." This unique collection of over 4,000 models, representing more than 830 plant species was created by artisans Leopold and Rudolf Blaschka, a father and son team of Czech glass artists

Laconia Gardens

Laconia resident Nancy Cladel spent more than 25 years working with the native plant initiative at the Manada Conservancy. She recently transformed a large garden bed near the Gazebo at the corner of Ledcroft and Kinsman to grow native plants. This bed is in the early stages of development but is already supporting copious numbers of pollinators. On the other side of the bed is a striking conventional flower garden being lovingly cared for by two dedicated residents with incomparable garden experience—Priscilla Matthews and Lynda Hartley. Most of these plants are annuals whereas the natives are perennials. The beds are very different in appearance and offer a striking contrast. Each has its purpose and place. “The goal might be to encourage the interplanting of both kinds of plants in the built landscapes of our yards and gardens in the hope that biodiversity on the campus can be enhanced while at the same time retaining some of the eye-popping color that is provided by the non-native annuals.” – Nancy Cladel

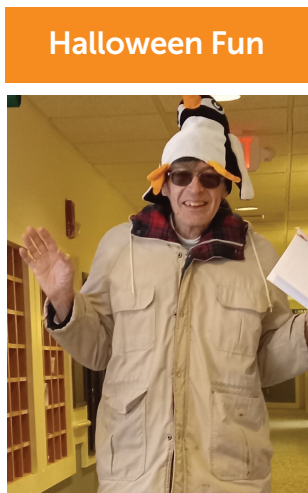
