We are kicking off our 2025 Children's Auction Pub Mania fundraising efforts with the Spring Shuffle at Patrick's Pub on Wednesday, April 23rd at 5:00 p.m. The Shuffle continues on Wednesday evenings through June 4th.

There is a \$10 suggested donation to the Pub Mania Shuffle for each week, which includes a fun raffle at 6:00 p.m. every week for prizes sponsored by Patrick's. Come and enjoy the fun!

The Shuffle includes an optional 2-mile walking route from Patrick's Pub for those who are interested. However, participants are not required to walk/shuffle and, indeed, many of us "culinary athletes" just shuffle right into the Pub for all the revelry and fun.

Tips for Creating a Butterfly Garden

1. Select a sunny site with a few broad-leafed trees or shrubs to provide cover from intense heat, wind, rain and predators.
2. Provide a water source, such as a shallow dish. Include a few rocks to provide a landing spot.
3. Plant colorful flowers! Adult butterflies need plants for nectaring and for laying their eggs. Plants like milkweed serve as a source of food for caterpillars once the larvae hatch. Some examples of butterfly-friendly plants include black-eyed Susans, Joe-pye weeds, purple coneflowers, lavender, salvias, zinnias, phlox, marigolds, lantana and butterfly bush.

Fire Safety for Seniors



Those of us that have achieved the milestone of 65 years of age or older have unknowingly become part of a demographic of people that are at an increased risk of injury or even death because of a fire situation. Statistics reveal that people at or above the age of 65 are at twice the risk of injury or death from a fire situation and that risk continues to increase as we get older.

Taylor Community is very mindful of fire safety for all of its residents, long term care and independent. Early detection of a fire is extremely important in notifying residents of a potential crisis and allowing them to evacuate in a timely manner, thereby reducing or eliminating injury. Fire detection equipment in the living units is necessary to achieve this capability.

All independent living units at Taylor Community have a combination of two separate early fire detection systems in place. Each unit has a system of “local 110V smoke detectors” that are located in the bedrooms and in the common space outside the bedroom area. When these activate, they sound only within the individual unit. These devices are interconnected so that when one goes into an alarm condition, they all sound. Annually the backup batteries in these detectors are changed by the maintenance crew and if the device has reached its ten-year life span it is replaced. The device in the common area is a combination smoke detector/carbon monoxide detector. The second early fire detection system that is in place in the independent units is a building wide fire alarm system. These systems are monitored by a fire alarm monitoring company that automatically notifies the local fire department upon activation.

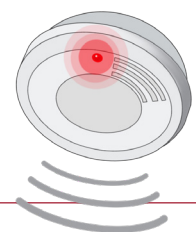
The Woodside Building, Sugar House, and Meredith Bay have a system that is comprised of system connected smoke detectors in the corridors and other common spaces as well as fire alarm pull stations at each exit door and spaced along the corridors. Activation of any one of these devices as well as operation of the automatic sprinkler system will sound evacuation horns throughout the common areas as well as in the individual units.

The independent cottages in Laconia and Wolfeboro have a similar system in each cottage. These systems consist of heat detectors, which are located in each room and the garage of the cottage. There is also a fire alarm pull station near the front door of each unit. When activated, a horn will sound and a strobe light will flash to indicate the alarm.

Should the local smoke detectors in your unit begin sounding, please take immediate action. If you are certain the reason for the detector sounding is because perhaps you burned some food, open the window and allow the smoke to clear. If there is a smoke condition in your unit and you do not know the source of the smoke, immediately leave your unit and pull the fire alarm pull station by your front door if you live in a cottage or the nearest one in the corridor if you live in one of the large multi-unit buildings.

Early detection of a fire and prompt evacuation save lives! Please evacuate immediately when the fire alarm sounds.

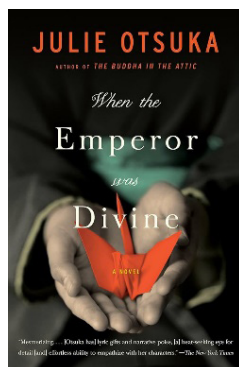

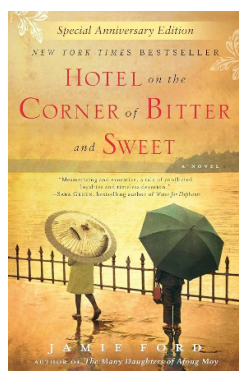


"When the Emperor was Divine," by Julie Otsuka

On a sunny day in Berkeley, California in 1942, a woman sees a sign in a post office window, returns to her home, and matter-of-factly begins to pack her family's possessions. Like thousands of other Japanese Americans, they have been reclassified, virtually overnight, as enemy aliens and are about to be uprooted from their home and sent to a dusty incarceration camp in the Utah desert.

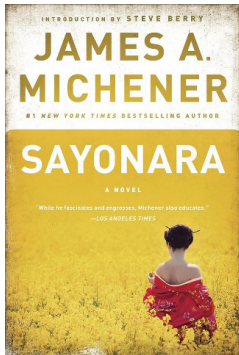

As Henry looks on, the owner opens a Japanese parasol.

This simple act takes old Henry Lee back to the 1940s, at the height of the war, when young Henry's world is a jumble of confusion and excitement, and to his father, who is obsessed with the war in China and having Henry grow up American. While "scholarshipping" at the exclusive Rainier Elementary, where the white kids ignore him, Henry meets Keiko Okabe, a young Japanese American student. Amid the chaos of blackouts, curfews, and FBI raids, Henry and Keiko forge a bond of friendship—and innocent love—that transcends the long-standing prejudices of their Old World ancestors. And after Keiko and her family are swept up in the evacuations to the internment camps, she and Henry are left only with the hope that the war will end, and that their promise to each other will be kept.

Forty years later, Henry Lee is certain that the parasol belonged to Keiko. In the hotel's dark dusty basement he begins looking for signs of the Okabe family's belongings and for a long-lost object whose value he cannot begin to measure. Now a widower, Henry is still trying to find his voice — words that might explain the actions of his nationalistic father; words that might bridge the gap between him and his modern, Chinese American son; words that might help him confront the choices he made many years ago.

Set during one of the most conflicted and volatile times in American history, "Hotel on the Corner of Bitter and Sweet" is an extraordinary story of commitment and enduring hope. In Henry and Keiko, Jamie Ford has created an unforgettable duo whose story teaches us of the power of forgiveness and the human heart.

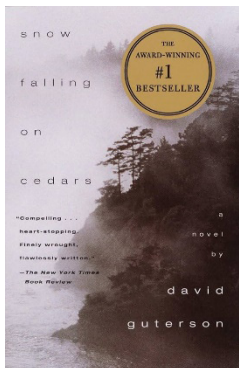

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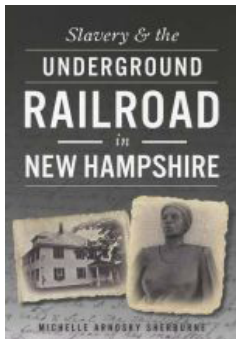

This Laconia Historical and Museum Society presentation on the history of Laconia's passenger station will be presented by Taylor Community Resident Frank Judge. The Laconia Passenger Station has played a significant role in our community, historically serving as a vital hub for transportation and the movement of goods. The completion of the Lake Shore Railroad in 1890 connected Alton to Laconia and linked it with the Boston, Concord, and Montreal lines. This development opened routes to the Seacoast, Boston, and Montreal, transforming Laconia into a railroad crossroads. However, what was missing was a grand structure to symbolize its importance. Plans

were quickly set in motion to replace the original station with “the best structure of the kind,” as noted in the Illustrated Laconian in 1899. The presentation will trace the historical timeline of rail service in Laconia and the evolution of the passenger station.

Frank Judge’s passion for railroading began while watching his grandfather’s steam engine–driven commuter train arrive at the station in the early 1950s. He became captivated by the railroad during an April 1976 tourist excursion from Laconia to Lincoln.

Frank has since purchased, restored, and operated a wooden 1914 Bangor & Aroostook Railroad caboose on the Wolfeboro Railroad until he relocated to Memphis in 1980 for his career. After returning to New Hampshire in 1986 and acquiring another caboose, his passion for railroading continued to grow.

In 1777, General Jonathan Moulton sold this piece of land to Samuel Burnham, “with barn frame thereon.” It was sold again in 1779 to George Freese, “trader.” Records of Bradbury Richardson, one of the first settlers, show transactions between the two – “labors for goods, July 30, 1781.” Hollands New Hampshire, printed in London, England, on March 1, 1784 shows the store as the only building in this part of town. The year the fieldwork was done is not known.

The store is among the oldest in the country and is also one of the oldest surviving businesses of any kind. It was the scene of town meetings in the early 1800s, and again in the 1900s; the library; the post office for over 100 years; and a stage stop. **The bus will leave Meredith Bay at 12:40 p.m.**
